# From the Leader of Teaching and Learning

#### Year 12 Trial exams

The Trial HSC exams for Year 12 students start next Monday. Students have been issued with their Trial exam timetable and can also access it on the Year 12 Edmodo page.

As the Trial exams give the students the opportunity to prepare for the demands of the H.S.C. exam, it is essential that the girls follow the rules relating to the conduct of exams. In short:

- Students should ensure that they arrive well before the scheduled time for each exam.
- If a student is sick and unable to attend school to complete the exam, her parents should contact Mrs Mendez at the College **in the morning**. The student must go to the doctor and get a doctor's certificate. Upon return to school, the usual procedures for illness or misadventure will apply. The student will complete the missed exam in the **next available time slot**.
- Mobile phones are not permitted in the examination room.

We wish the girls every success as take this next step towards their completion of the senior school studies.

#### Year 9 courses for 2016

Year 8 students are starting to consider their programme of study for 2016 – 2017. At Nagle the girls in Stage 5 select **two** elective subjects, which they study for two years.

Over the next two weeks Year 8 students will have access to the Stage 5 course booklet, which describes the courses that we offer. In addition, KLA leaders and specialist teachers will outline courses and their requirements to the girls. Students will then be required to submit their preferences for courses online.

Students are urged to select subjects based on their personal interests and their talents. Obviously these are different for each student, so the girls would be unwise to select a particular course because friends are interested in it. Parents are encouraged to discuss subject choice with their daughters, stressing the importance of maintaining a balanced approach to their studies. Hopefully a combination of hard work and enjoyment of the subject will allow the girls to fully benefit from their studies over the next two years.

Although students will inevitably look ahead to the Higher School Certificate, Stage 5 is a great opportunity for students to explore new interests and experiment with their learning. Students will discover their strengths and, perhaps, use this information in setting long-term goals.

# From the Leader of Student Well-being

Good mental health is about being able to work and study to your full potential, cope with day-today life stresses, be involved in your community and live life in a free and satisfying way.

A young person who has good mental health has good emotional and social well-being and the capacity to cope with change and challenges.

Young people can go through many different changes as they grow up. Raising sensitive issues and resolving problems that arise along the way can be challenging for them. Feeling down, tense, angry, anxious or moody are all normal emotions for young people, but when these feelings persist for long periods of time, or if they begin to interfere with their daily life, they may be part of a mental health problem. Mental health problems can also influence how young people think and their ability to function in their everyday activities, whether at school, at work or in relationships.

To help continue our conversation on mental health, Nagle will be holding a Parent Forum on the topic of anxiety and depression in young people. A guest speaker from Headspace will join us on the evening. The forum will be held at the College on the evening of Monday the 3<sup>rd</sup> August, commencing at 6.30pm. # What's happening in Year 8

The Year 8's have been busy in their classes after the holidays and getting back into Term 3. The girls will be involved in a bullying workshop on the 7<sup>th</sup> of August and will observe the impact of bullying on individuals. The Year 8 social is on the 26<sup>th</sup> of August and I hope to see all the girls attend the evening as it is a great way to socialise not only with their peers but also the Patrician Brother's Boys. For sport this term the girls will be involved in cheerleading, stretch and strength, musical theatre, hip hop and boot camp.

Here is snap shot of what Year 8 have been doing in class and what they will continue to work on throughout this term.

In English, the girls are learning about film studies and how a film is made using different film techniques.

In French, Year 8s are learning about how to introduce and speak about their families in French. At the moment they are making a scrapbook about their families.

In History, the students are learning about ancient India and how Indians evolved and survived in ancient times.

In Science, the girls are learning about area and ecosystems and are going to design an island with ecosystems and have to make it a bird's eye view. The island needs to be complete with measurements of the area of the island and this will be done in small groups and they will work together to make a successful design.

In Technology, the Year 8s have been doing textiles and backyard blitz. They will be learning how to make and create a bag in textiles and how to design and construct a miniature backyard model.

In Music, students are going over the basics on the guitar and keyboard and will soon start to prepare a song to perform as part of a group assignment.

In Art, students are learning about patterns and colours and later in the term they will make a sculpture out of clay from their own materials showing the pattern of sculpture.

In Religion, Year 8 students are learning about images of God and how they see god compared to others and why everyone has different images of God.

In PDHPE, Year 8 are focusing on risk taking behaviour and are learning about positive and negative risks and how to be safe in risk taking situations. In practical lessons the girls are doing fitness testing and working to improve their fitness levels.

### From the Year 11 Co-ordinator


Welcome to Semester Two!

### The Australian Geography Competition 2015

Congratulations to the 26 students in Years 7 to 12 who received an award for Participation, Credit, Distinction or High Distinction in the Australian Geography Competition.

The Australian Geography Competition is a competition for Australian secondary school students, based on their geographical knowledge and skills. The Competition aims to encourage student interest in geography and to reward student excellence. Over 75,000 students participated in this competition.

The Competition is held in schools each year in late March. It consists of multiple-choice questions testing geographical knowledge and skills. The answer sheets are centrally marked and all participants receive results and certificates – high distinction, distinction, credit or participation. Students are graded at three age levels – Junior for students 13 and under; Intermediate for students 14 and 15 years old; Senior for students 16 to 18 years old.

Students received their awards at the whole school assembly.




### Key Dates for Year 12
