This Friday 31st October, we are acknowledging teachers. World Teachers Day, held annually on October 5th since 1994 - when it was created by UNESCO - celebrates teachers worldwide. Its aim is to promote the work of teachers and to highlight the importance of this work for future generations. Due to school holidays, World Teachers Day is celebrated in Australia on the last Friday in October. At a time when many young people in our world are denied an education, it is important to acknowledge the gift of education that is made possible by teachers. It is easy to take for granted what many of our global brothers and sisters are denied.

For members of Catholic learning communities, our work contributes to the broader work of our Church. Teachers can provide students with opportunities to encounter Jesus Christ in their daily work. Teaching is not just a job, it is a vocation.

Jesus' teaching ministry was not primarily about transmitting information, but about changing lives. When Jesus was ready to transfer his ministry over to Peter before his Ascension, he appeared to Peter on the shore of Lake Tiberias. During this encounter, Jesus asked Peter one question, and he asked it three times. The question does not look for a recitation of facts about Jesus' teachings (important as they are!), but is, simply, 'Peter, do you love me? Do you love me?' The heart of Jesus' teaching mission, and so the heart of our mission, is to transform our students' lives into lives of love, love of God and of one another.

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Pope Francis spoke on education in an interview in April, 2012. He said:

I wondered if our educational endeavour shouldn't be directed to achieving harmony: harmony in all boys and girls who have been entrusted to us, inner harmony, harmony of their personality. It is by working as a potter, imitating God, shaping the life of these children, that we will be able to achieve harmony, and rescue them from the dissonances that are always dark. Teachers are called to share the love of Christ with their students – may they know Jesus Christ as a personal friend and experience your unconditional love.

Teachers are called to make the truth accessible and beautiful – bless them with wisdom to recognize Jesus as the way, the truth and the life in all they teach.

Send your Holy Spirit upon all teachers. Give them the courage to be true disciples. Bless them with serenity, good health and the joy of finding you in each person they teach.

Young people and technology

Recently I spoke with the students about their use of technology. Technology is a wonderful thing. It allows us to communicate in new and imaginative ways. Technology allows collaboration amongst learners and allows teachers to have the curriculum available to students 24/7.

Technology, like so many other aspects of modern life, needs to be kept in balance. Teachers report that a significant and growing number of students come to class tired and not ready to engage in the learning that has been planned. This is of concern on two levels. Students are disadvantaging themselves as future learning will be negatively impacted upon and they are showing disrespect to the teachers' efforts in planning the learning.

The girls were advised to have a set bedtime and to turn off all devices, leaving them somewhere else in the house. Having a phone or other device next to their bed and engaging in social media all through the night is detrimental to not only their learning but also their health. Lack of sleep impacts on the immune system, leading to ill health and possibly absence from school that in turn adds to the learning deficit.

Please set clear expectations about your daughter's access to technology after bedtime. This way you are supporting the College in creating the best possible environment for learning.

Student Leadership

As previously mentioned we are restructuring student leadership at Nagle College for 2015. There will be a Student Representative Council (SRC). The appointment of SRC leaders is well underway. The process involves students submitting an application, student and staff voting and then appointment by the Principal based on the voting of both staff and students.2015's Year 12 leaders have been appointed, including House Captains and House Vice Captains. The rest of the voting and appointing will be done over the next week. It is very encouraging that so many of our girls believe that they have the qualities to lead and represent the student body. The SRC will be responsible for voicing the ideas of the student body. The SRC will meet regularly with a solution-focused approach to school improvement.

Year 9 have also been exploring different Habits of the Mind as part of the Learning to Learn program.

The Habits of Mind are an identified set of 16 problem solving, life related skills necessary to effectively operate in society and promote strategic reasoning, insightfulness, perseverance, creativity and craftsmanship. The understanding and application of these 16 Habits of Mind serve to provide the individual with skills to work through real life situations that equip each person to respond using awareness (cues), thought, and intentional strategy in order to gain a positive outcome. Students will relate these habits to personal experiences and their learning, and develop strategies to improve their learning behaviours to help achieve their learning goals.

Over the last two weeks they have been exploring the Habits:

Thinking Flexibility, taking reasonable risks and thinking interdependently

Thinking Flexibly: Able to change perspective; Consider the input of others; Generate alternatives; Weigh options.

Taking Responsible Risks: Willing to try something new and different; Consider doing things that are safe and sane even though new to me; Face fear of making mistakes or of coming up short and don't let this stop me.

Thinking Interdependently: Willing to work with others and welcome their input and perspective; Abide by decisions the work group makes even if I disagree somewhat; Willing to learn from others in reciprocal situations.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme 2015

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme is operational at Nagle College in 2015 and students aged 14 and over may join the program. The Award is a self-development program available to all young people. The Award is non-competitive and encourages young people to set and achieve goals at a level appropriate to their needs. There are four sections that must be completed for a young person to qualify for an Award: Service, Skills, Physical Recreation and Adventurous Journeys. These activities provide an opportunity for students to acquire and develop skills, initiative and self-esteem which will help them become more confident and contributing members of the community. The Award is highly regarded by many employers.

Participants design their own program by selecting activities they are interested in, setting their own goals and striving to achieve their own potential. The Award has three levels – Bronze, Silver and Gold. New students start at the Bronze level.

To obtain the Bronze Award students must complete the following Sections:

Service: voluntary Community Service spread over 3 months or complete an appropriate

course of specialised training such as a First Aid course.

(3 months of regular commitment averaging at least 1 hour per week)

Skills: a cultural or social activity must be pursued leading to a deeper knowledge of the

subject and the attainment of a reasonable degree of skill eg. playing a musical

instrument, languages

(3 months of regular commitment averaging at least 1 hour per week)

Physical Recreation: participation in an individual or group physical activity

(3 months of regular commitment averaging at least 1 hour per week)

Adventurous Journey: complete preliminary training and a practice trip and then a self-sufficient

expedition (total of 2 overnight trips)

*Note: All Bronze participants must complete an extra 3 months activity in either Service, Skills or Physical Recreation

At the skills day, students were introduced to "Your Tutor" which is an online tool for Fast Forward students that gives them access to qualified HSC teachers for help with homework and revision. They spent some time looking at alternative pathways to achieving career goals and were spoken to about "Uni track", which allows you to pay for up to two units of study at University as a taster to see if the course is for you. The students came away with a sense that anything is possible if you work hard and set your mind to it.

The girls are to be congratulated on their behaviour and their involvement in the activities. They are all very much looking forward to the Year 12 Conference in March next year.
