Nano Nagle continues to provide a strong example of feminine leadership as she sought to give light and hope to the poor. Her strong faith nourished her in darker times as she struggled to establish her schools. Her actions brought her into closer relationship with Jesus.

Jesus said of himself, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." John (8:12) Now, we are God's light in this world. We are the ones to be witnesses to his compassion and love, not only through our words but in our way of life. We are asked to serve those less fortunate such as a lonely housebound person in need of company or those who have lost their homes and possessions because of cyclone, fire, flood or earthquake. We are asked to be patient, understanding, kind and sacrificing to other members of our family and our friends. It is easy to criticise, to point out the faults of others, to condemn and complain about others but when we do these things, we move into "darkness" and God's face no longer shines through our countenance.

I believe that Nagle girls shine in so many ways. Whether a girl has a formal leadership position or not, she has the capacity to make the world a better place through her actions.

Jesus, light of the world, Shine through the darkness bright as the day. Jesus, light of the world, Shine in our hearts, show us the way.

Last Wednesday we gathered together to celebrate the beginning of the Church's season of Lent. It is a time of prayer, fasting and almsgiving for Catholics. Giving to the poor or 'almsgiving' is a sign of our commitment to justice and of thanks for all that God has given us.

Lent leads up to the season of Easter, the most important time in the Church's calendar. By praying, fasting and giving alms we are reminded of Jesus' death and Resurrection. Jesus brought the promise of hope for all people so that we may "Have life and have it to the full." (John 10:10)

We recognise that we are called to work for a just and fair world for all people. From the Leader of Teaching and Learning

FIVE REASONS NOT TO PUT OFF STARTING ASSIGNMENTS

Here are five reasons why you should start working on your assignment immediately.

1. GET YOUR BRAIN THINKING ABOUT THE TOPIC

Even if your assignment isn't due for weeks, start thinking about it immediately. At the very least, answer the key starter questions (below) on the day you get your assignment. Even if you are not thinking about it directly, your subconscious will be hard at work.

2. FIND LIBRARY RESOURCES

Although the school or local library will probably not be your main source of reference, you should drop in soon after receiving the assignment. Your teacher will probably have alerted Ms Price to the assignment and reference books, magazines etc. may well be displayed. These will disappear quickly if the whole class has the same

assignment. Books, periodicals and magazines can sometimes give a useful general overview for an assignment and they help to clarify a direction as you begin to immerse yourself into the assignment topic. It is **not** a good idea to use only Google.

3. DISCOVER OTHER RESOURCES

You could also ask your local librarian for any additional direction to explore for resource material for your assignment. Librarians are often your best source of information. They know how to help people access relevant and appropriate information, in books, the Internet or computer-based references. One of the challenging aspects of Internet-based searches for school students is the complexity, language and purpose of websites, not to mention bias and reliability.

4. STARTING EARLY MEANS MORE TIME TO EXPLORE & ASK FOR HELP IF NEEDED

If you do some initial research on the assignment points you've identified through the library, references your teacher may have given you, school textbooks, and general internet search engines, you could find yourself having more direction in your research. For example, perhaps there might not be enough information or perhaps you find you don't understand important concepts. Maybe you need to speak to your teacher to get further clarity. If you discover this early, you will still have plenty of time to plan, research, write and present your assignment. If you leave starting until the last minute, you could easily run out of time.

5. CREATE A SAFETY NET

Starting your assignment immediately will give you a safety net in case you get sick, or something unexpected happens. Assignments are usually given because they require more time; students should develop a strategy to ensure that all tasks are completed on time. You should always have a schedule that allows for the unexpected.

So get started today and don't forget to learn more about how to improve your results and be more efficient and effective with your schoolwork by working through the units on www.studyskillshandbook.com.au. Our school's access details are:

- 2. Have a copy of your timetable at home on the fridge or family notice board. This way, even if you leave your diary at school, you will still know what you have for class the next day.
- 3. Use your diary. Make sure you are writing in your diary when things are due and what you need to do for homework.
- 4. Record important dates on the family calendar.
- 5. Return notes ASAP. Even though your notes will have a due date, return them ASAP so you do not have to worry about them.
- 6. Remember to talk to your parents about the amazing things that you are doing at school.

Hopefully putting these simple strategies into place will help to make life a little less stressful both at home and at school.

Year 12 students are now busily preparing themselves for the examination period starting on the 31st March and concluding on 10th April. To ensure that this examination period is as smooth as possible, it would be beneficial to take note of the following:

- The girls are required to arrive at least twenty minutes before the exam is due to begin.
- In case of illness on the day of the exam, parents need to ring the College in the morning of that day. Your daughter must go to the doctor and get medical certificate. Upon return to school, an illness/misadventure form needs to be completed and usual procedures followed. The exam will be completed in the next available time slot.
- All equipment required for the exam needs to be brought in: pens, pencils, ruler, eraser, calculator and a stapler with staples. These should be in a clear plastic sleeve.
- It would be sensible to bring tissues and water.
- There is no room for valuables in the hall. We recommend that bags, books , etc are locked in lockers.
- Mobile phones need to be turned off and given to Mrs Smith prior to each exam.
- Upon entry to the exam room, material needs to be shown to the supervisors.

ASSESSMENT TASKS

When your daughter has a formal assessment task due for submission, it needs to handed in or be submitted **between 8.20 and 8.40**. It is very important that this timeframe is adhered to as penalties apply for late submissions.

NSWCCC Triathlon

Last week on the 6th and 7th March we had 6 girls compete at the NSWCCC triathlon event at the Regatta Centre Penrith. It was a gruelling competition with students travelling from all over NSW to compete.

On Thursday Olivia Sargent competed in the individual event. Olivia, who is a Western Sydney Academy scholarship holder for triathlon, finished in 49th place overall against a huge field of 474. This put her in 2nd place in the competing Catholic schools in NSW and the 13th overall female.

I also want to take this opportunity to congratulate Olivia for some outstanding results in the last few months for the sport of Triathlon. On the 11th January, Olivia competed in the Australian junior triathlon series held at the Regatta Centre Penrith. It was a tough event and Olivia had a crash on her bike leg but still managed to finish 4th in the youth category (13-15 year olds) and was the first NSW girl to cross the finish line. Based on these results and Olivia's results from the runaway event in Queensland last December, in which Olivia was placed 10th in the super sprint series, she has been placed 5th in the overall point score in the Australian junior triathlon series for the youth female age group. This is a huge achievement for Olivia and we want to wish her all the best in her upcoming events.







Our Intermediate team consisted of Olivia Sargent on the bike, Marianna Tinkas in the run and Hunter Hakim in the swim leg. These girls achieved the best result Nagle has had to date. They were placed 91 overall out of 336 teams, they were the 5th Catholic team to cross the line and the 25th female team in their age division.

Friday was the team's event with 6 girls competing over two events. Our Senior team which has not missed the event in 4 years, took to the track for the last time, with Bronte Groeneveld in the swim leg, Gabrielle tanks in the run leg and Natasha Estrada on the bike. Congratulations to these 3 girls, who have always in all they have done for Nagle College, represented the college with the upmost sportswomanship and a smile regardless of the result. We will miss them in next year's event.



This was a great achievement for these girls and I look forward to seeing what they produce next year.










Captivate Song Writing Masterclass




